A Message from the Mayor

History, despite its wrenching pain, cannot be unlived, but if faced with courage, need not be lived again.

Maya Angelou

I recently read *The Buried Giant* by Kazuo Ishiguro. Without giving away too much of the story (it is really good, I recommend it) the author poses the question of whether it is better to remember or better to forget the wrongs of the past. Can forgetting these wrongs create lasting peace? Will remembering these wrongs create a cycle of violence and revenge or must wrongs be remembered and faced to bring lasting peace and justice?

This fall Louisville will remember an unfortunate event in our past. In October 1915 Marshall Victor Helburg was shot and killed when he stopped a street vendor to check his license. He is still the only Louisville law enforcement officer to be killed in the line of duty. A committee including members of the family, members of the Police Department, and other members of the community has been working for several years to recognize Marshall Helburg's sacrifice. The efforts of the committee will come to fruition in the form of the "Louisville Law Enforcement Memorial at Helburg Park" to be built on land on the northeast side of the Police Department. The City will provide the land and some of the funding, but much of the project will be built with private donations. A ground breaking ceremony occurred in May. The plan is to dedicate the Memorial on the 100th anniversary of the Marshall's death on October 28, 2015.

We are very fortunate, in my view, to have an excellent Police Department in Louis-

Coal Creek Golf Course Reopening June 27

This summer, Louisville residents and surrounding communities can once again enjoy swinging their clubs at Coal Creek Golf Course. The City invites you to help us celebrate the **Grand Re-Opening of Coal Creek on Saturday, June 27, 10 AM to 4 PM**. The day will be full of fun activities for the whole family, golfers and non-golfers alike. There will be a Hole-in-One competition, Longest Drive contest, and course tours. On Sunday, June 28, golfers have their first chance to play a round on the redesigned course as part of a fundraising event. Starting Monday, June 29, Coal Creek Golf Course will be open for regular play. Besides reopening for golf, Coal Creek will return as host of the Fourth of July fireworks this year.

The course closed following damage from the September 2013 flood. Since then, City staff and Landscapes Unlimited (LU) have worked tirelessly to rebuild. The course has witnessed significant renovation. Landscape crews have rebuilt 14 greens; constructed fairways and tee boxes, as well as sand bunkers; relined ponds; installed new irrigation; reseeded and sodded the course; repaired the parking lot;

The City is developing a City-wide Preservation Master Plan for its historic preservation program. The City has a unique preservation program supported by a dedicated sales tax that has resulted in over 20 historic landmarks. However, the City has never adopted a preservation master plan to guide the program. The 2013 Comprehensive Plan update called for the creation of such a plan to define the goals of the preservation program and map out how to achieve them.

The City is interested in properly recognizing Louisville History through preservation, analyzing current historic preservation regulations, and engaging the community regarding the future of historic preservation. During the process of developing the Preservation Master Plan, Louisville residents have been asked to define a community vision, respond to questions about the existing preservation program, and outline goals for historic preservation. The City is working with historic preservation consultant HistoryMatters for an external review of the program and guidance on best practices. The Preservation Master Plan will be reviewed and considered for adoption by the City Council during the summer of 2015. SOUTH BOULDER RD & McCASLIN BLVD

The regulations will include allowed land uses and building forms, as well as desired infrastructure improvements and areas for public spaces like parks and plazas.

and rerouted cart paths. In addition, crews implemented improvements previously outlined in the Golf Course Improvement Plan, removed outdated timber walls, and constructed new practice facilities including a 22,000 sq. ft. Punch Bowl Green...the first in our region. Coal Creek was able to bounce back from the flooding this past Mother's Day and is beginning to look like an operating golf course again.

As construction winds down, we continue to remind the public to stay off the golf course for personal safety, to avoid damage to the new turf, and to give us every opportunity to promote and establish the turf grow-in throughout the year.

Inside the clubhouse, changes are in the works as well. The Mine at Coal Creek restaurant has been outsourced, the space is also undergoing upgrades, and menus are developing with tasty treats. The pro-shop is ordering merchandise to please a wide range of golfers. Additionally, marketing and communications are readying to launch a Coal Creek Golf Course Facebook page and Twitter handle so our golfers can keep up with the latest happenings and special offers.

CONSTRUCTION AHEAD

The Summer construction season is underway and there are many projects around town that will impact travel. We would like to thank everyone for your patience and understanding during the construction season and remind everyone to exercise caution when driving, biking, or walking through a construction zone.



Downtown Construction - Multiple projects are scheduled for downtown this year, a project map is available on the city's web site. Projects that will have the most impact on residents and businesses are highlighted below.

Sewer Replacement - The project includes the replacement of the sewerline on Johnson Street and in the alley east of Lafarge Avenue and south of Pine Street. Several businesses and residents will be affected by this work and will receive schedule notices in the weeks prior to construction.

Storm Sewer Outfall Improvements Phase II - This project will install storm water infrastructure and remove a portion of downtown from the floodplain. Construction on Front Street between Pine Street and South Street will not commence until the fall or winter.

Additional work will occur throughout town including: resurfacing Via Appia from McCaslin Blvd. to South Boulder Road, the installation of two traffic signals: one at Dillon Road and St. Andrews Lane and one at Paschal Drive and Highway 42, and the construction of the new bridge on County Road.

OPEN SPACE NEWS

Remove Myrtle Spurge!

Myrtle spurge is a noxious weed which can invade open spaces and residential landscapes and is dangerous to people, wildlife, and native plants. This low-growing perennial plant is 4 - 8 inches tall with fleshy blue-green triangle-shaped leaves and yellowish-green flower-like bracts in the spring. The leaves and stems have a toxic milky latex which can cause severe skin irritation and is poisonous if ingested.



Spreading rapidly from gardens to natural areas, myrtle spurge can out-compete native vegetation and reduce forage for wildlife. It is a List A noxious weed required for eradication by the Colorado Noxious Weed Act. If you have myrtle spurge on your property, please remove it by hand-pulling, digging, or treatments with herbicides containing 2, 4-D or Roundup. Wear protective gloves, a long-sleeved shirt, and glasses when handling the plant and carefully dig up as much of the root system as possible and dispose of in a garbage bag (tie up the bag so that seeds cannot escape). **Do not compost and do not plant myrtle spurge.** If you need help identifying myrtle spurge or have any questions, please contact the Open Space Division at 303.335.4742.

This volunteer event is made possible through this funding to help curtail this invasive species that is growing abundantly on North Open Space. ***Pulling for Colorado*** is a statewide campaign to educate the public about noxious weeds and promote on-going weed control efforts.

Come learn why noxious weed management is important during weed identification training from 9-9:30 AM and then help clip seed heads and dig up noxious weeds that are threatening the North Open Space. Refreshments and snacks provided. Bring gloves and be prepared for the elements (bring sunscreen, pants, hat, sunglasses, NO open-toed shoes).

BUSINESS RETENTION & DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The BRaD Committee is a City Council committee comprised of three City Council members and representatives from the Chamber of Commerce, the Downtown Business Association, the Colorado Tech Center, the Revitalization Commission, and the Planning Commission. It meets the first Monday of each month in the Library meeting room, 951 Spruce Street, at 8:00 AM.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The City Council Finance Committee is comprised of the Mayor and two City Council members. The members meet with staff to discuss financial matters the third Monday of every month at City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 7:30 AM.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Board of Adjustment is a quasi-judicial board that hears and decides requests for variances from the City's zoning ordinances. The Board meets the third Wednesday of each month at City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 6:30 PM, only as needed.

BUILDING CODE BOARD OF APPEALS

The Board of Appeals hears and decides appeals of orders, decisions, or determinations made by building officials relative to the application of the building code. The Board meets the third Thursday of each month at the City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 6:30 PM, only as needed.

CULTURAL COUNCIL

The Cultural Council produces cultural activities and works to advance and preserve the arts in Louisville. The Council meets the third Thursday of each month at City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 6:30 PM.

GOLF COURSE ADVISORY BOARD

The GCAB advises the City on matters related to the Coal Creek Golf Course and its management. The Board meets the third Monday of each month at the Library Meeting Room, 951 Spruce Street, at 6:30 PM.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION

The Historic Preservation Commission advises the City on preservation issues and use of the Historic Preservation Fund, and oversees the designation of properties as local landmarks. The Commission meets the third Monday of each month at City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 7:00 PM.

HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Historical Commission promotes public awareness of the history of Louisville, with an emphasis on the coal mining era, and advises the Louisville Historical Museum. The Commission meets the first Wednesday of odd-numbered months at Library Meeting Room, 951 Spruce Street, at 6:30 PM.

HORTICULTURE & FORESTRY ADVISORY BOARD

The Horticulture Board advises the City on the development and implementation of public landscape projects and supports healthy horticulture practices through public education. The Board meets the first Thursday of each month at the Recreation Center, 900 West Via Appia, at 7:00 PM.

LIBRARY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

LOCAL LICENSING AUTHORITY

OPEN SPACE ADVISORY BOARD

The Planning Commission evaluates land use proposals, holds public hearings to evaluate each proposal against municipal ordinances and zoning regulations, and makes recommendations to the City Council. REVITALIZATION COMMISSION

YOUTH ADVISORY BOARD
