City of Louisville - Ballot error issue - please review

Dear City of Louisville voters:

Boulder County Elections is dedicated to transparency, accountability, and integrity in all our activities, which is why we are reaching out today.

It has come to our attention that we had a ballot contest error. We inadvertently included the Ward 3 city council contest on all Louisville ballots instead of just Ward 3 ballots.

We apologize for this error. **Please know that you may vote the ballot we mailed to you.** During ballot processing, we will be able to isolate the Ward 3 ballots so that only ballots cast in that district are counted toward the vote totals in that race. Additionally, please note that the Ward 3 contest only has one candidate on the ballot (only 1 option to vote for).

Our team is committed to conducting accessible, accurate, secure, and efficient elections, which is why we take a ballot mistake like this extremely seriously and we hold ourselves accountable for this mistake. Please know that our staff is in the process of reviewing the steps that led to this error and will take actionable steps to improve our processes to avoid such issues in the future.

FAQ:

Do I need to know whether I live in Ward 3 to vote my ballot?

No. If you vote for the Ward 3 contest and you are ineligible to vote for that contest, we will not include your vote in that contest in the vote totals for that contest. The rest of your votes in every other contest will be counted as normal.

What if I already voted and I do not live in Ward 3 (or do not know)?

Please do not be concerned. Your ballot will be counted like normal. We will simply make sure that your vote cast in that contest is not included in the vote totals for that contest if you were ineligible to vote in Ward 3.

If I know I don't live in Ward 3 should I skip the contest?

Yes. If you know for certain you do not live in Ward 3, please skip contest.

How do I find out if I live in Ward 3*?

Please visit the Secretary of State's website, www.GoVoteColorado.gov, to look up your registration information. After pulling up your information, click on the "County & District Information" tab. Look down the list to confirm which Louisville City Ward you are in. Louisville has three wards. You can also look at this [map](#) on the City of Louisville's website. Please note that the GoVoteColorado.gov website will be inaccessible between 5 p.m. Sunday evening and 8 a.m. Monday morning due to a statewide maintenance update. See their [press release](#).

Dear Kristina,

Thank you for your recent e-mail to our City Council about the airplane noise over Louisville. Airplane noise continues to be a growing and intolerable issue for our community.

During the past months we have had several meetings and conversations with the Rocky Mountain Metropolitan Airport (RMMA) staff and our consultants. Little has been accomplished through those efforts since the RMMA airport staff claim that the airspace issues and routes chosen by private pilots and flight schools are not something that the airport has direct control over, so they have limited ability to effect changes. Those issues are controlled at the federal level through the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). Our consultants have validated those airport staff claims.

In trying to help, the RMMA staff have been communicating and meeting with flight school and private plane owners about the noise issues and to continue to educate them on the voluntary airport noise abatement recommendations that are in place. Obviously, there has been little impact and compliance with the voluntary procedures.

We have become increasingly convinced that the most productive route to help solve the noise mitigation issues will need to involve the FAA as well as other state and local governmental entities. The recommended FAA strategy towards that end is to establish an FAA sanctioned Airport Noise Community Roundtable.

We have been working with RMMA, Jefferson and Boulder Counties, and other impacted municipalities (Superior, Broomfield, Arvada, Westminster, etc.) to establish the Roundtable and several meetings of our various staffs have occurred in the past 60 days towards that end. There are bylaws and intergovernmental agreements that have been or are being drafted which we hope to have approved by the various bodies within 60 days with the goal of having the first meeting of the Roundtable by the end of the year.

There does not appear to be any direct opposition by any of the stakeholders in establishing the Roundtable, so we are hopeful that this important step in the process of getting some relief can be established.

But, it has become increasingly obvious that there is limited leverage that municipal governments have in effecting real change in airport expansions, airport user profiles, and control of airspace and flight routing.

We will continue to be as aggressive as we can be as a single local government. But, it would be helpful for our residents to also contact our federal, state, and county representatives to

they are sensitive to our issues and concerns and can also help us out.

The nomination must be received by October 20. Be aware that the nominee must be older than 18 years and preferably older than 21. The nominee must agree in writing to be considered, and must agree to serve if elected, so please check with your nominee before submitting the name. One of the Board vacancies is the Treasurer. Board officers are elected by the Board itself, but if you would like to recommend your nominee to be considered for Treasurer, please indicate this on the nomination.

After checking qualifications, member nominees will be added to the written ballot together with the recommendations of the Nominating Committee. This ballot will be sent to all members of record as of November 1st. Instructions for completing and returning the ballots will be sent out at that time.

At the Annual Meeting, members also have the ability to forward resolutions (motions) to be considered by the membership. To be considered, the motion must be seconded by another member. In keeping with the spirit of this, if you have any business you would like to bring to the membership for a vote, please include the wording of the resolution, the name of the member “co-sponsoring” the resolution, and a description of no more than 500 words describing the reasons for the resolution and why members should approve it. The Board may include a similar 500 word statement as to why the resolution should not be approved. All this information will be included on the ballot.

These resolutions must also be received no later than October 20. Please send your resolutions to one of the addresses above.

You are under no obligation to do either of these two things. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me or any other Board Director.

Cheryl Townson has two sons, Adam & Andrew, grown now to ages 31 and 33 who nonetheless have left echoes of their recurring childish voices asking, "MOM! Are you doing another *tree painting*?"

Her favorite subjects are aspen, and these pieces are not shy. Many are 5-6 feet high, abstract, and painted with a two inch wide palette knife. Really, much of her work is a little smaller, reaching perhaps only 40" by 30" She tries to accomplish such pieces in a couple of nights.



Asked if she does other subjects, she admitted to "quite a bit of florals." This understatement concealed the fact that her parents came from a farm community near Spokane, where she absorbed all things vegetable from them, particularly her Dad. She later bought the house she grew up in with its additional two city lots, and went to work growing flowers everywhere. She wholesaled masses of these to local florists under the name "Yesterday's Garden" and seems to be able to persuade anything to thrive. Even in Colorado's startlingly dry weather.

Her husband, Bruce Townson's job relocated the family from Spokane, WA, Salt Lake City for several years and then to Superior, CO in 1996.

Her whole art adventure started for her in high school, where she studied art for all four years. Washington State University offered her a four year scholarship, but she chose junior college and secured a job in a large Home and Nursery business in Spokane, which established her in her career as nursery manager, and flooded her with plant and business knowledge for the next 14 years.

Currently, she's painting a number of buffalo, having probably something to do with CU parents appearing in Boulder just now. These she does with brushes, and they may take a week or two. Many of her sales come through friends, or Facebook & Instagram, like an 11x14 Pomeranian dog which was finished in about 5 hours and then shipped off to Chicago. Cheryl's Facebook account is under Cheryl Entel Townson/ Townson Studios, Instagram Cheryl Entel Townson-#Colortime2021. Her email is ct662057@yahoo.com.

She appreciates LAA a great deal, saying that LAA demos always provide a new inspiration or concept. Cheryl has volunteered to help set up and pack up recent shows, even during the Covid catastrophe. Social distancing is followed with masks and carefully spaced tables, needing to get closer together only with the gigantic heavily framed photos that sometimes crop up.

Currently Cheryl shares a large showing through Art in Public Places with LAA members Kirk Fry, Sheila Fossum, and Rebecca Martin at Market Place Dental in Superior, 306 Center Drive, which holds about 65 of their pieces in its huge space. -McKee

FasTracks Positively Impacting the Region's Quality of Life



Since RTD began implementing its FasTracks transit expansion program in 2005, the agency has tracked and monitored the impacts of the program through its Quality of Life studies. The studies synthesize RTD's data-driven evaluation of progress in meeting the FasTracks Program goals. Data is tracked annually in order to compare metrics over time. The 2020 Quality of Life Study is complete. Here are some of the takeaways from this year's study:

- 34,300 multifamily housing units are within a half-mile of a rail or BRT station
- 3,300 affordable housing units are within a half-mile of a rail or BRT station
- Traffic congestion caused 77 million hours of travel delay in 2018
- Time spent in congestion per day equals 229,000 vehicle hours
- 64% of greenhouse gas emissions are from the transportation sector, but...
- .4% of GHG emissions are from transit buses
- 240,000 tons of carbon emissions were displaced due to transit

Dear Mayor & City Council Member,

We ask that you impose a moratorium on “small cells” and other wireless infrastructure permits process and deployment until the COVID-19 emergency is over.

The wireless providers are using the COVID-19 emergency as cover to expand and cement their rapid and virtually unsupervised deployment of harmful wireless infrastructure. Our local leaders should not have to dedicate time and resources to policing whether the wireless companies are following local and state law, they have far more important things to do.

The FCC wireless permit rules allow emergency moratoria. Homeland Security guidelines emphasize that maintenance of existing communications capability is the priority. New construction is not “essential.”

The COVID-19 emergency has led to a government shut down of non-essential activity. Hospitals, emergency response and local officials are overwhelmed and they must be allowed to focus on what is indeed “essential”. Now is not the time to be dedicating resources to expanding, rather than just maintaining, our networks.

The FCC has directly held a local jurisdiction can impose a temporary halt to deployment and permits during emergencies. In the Matter of Accelerating Wireline Broadband Deployment by Removing Barriers, FCC 18-111, 33 FCC Rcd 7705, 7784-7785, ¶157 (2018) (“We recognize that there may be limited situations in the case of a natural disaster or other comparable emergency where an express or de facto moratoria that violates section 253(a) may nonetheless be ‘necessary’ to ‘protect the public safety and welfare’ or to ‘ensure the continued quality of telecommunications services.’”)

Homeland Security has declared that local government is on the forefront and can take control over determining whether to temporarily halt all non-essential activity. Homeland Security guidance documents prioritize maintenance of existing Communications Systems, and do not support “essential” status for new construction. See Homeland Security Cybersecurity & Infrastructure Security Agency, Identifying Critical Infrastructure During COVID-19, <https://www.cisa.gov/identifying-critical-infrastructure-during-covid-19> (local control); e-Critical Infrastructure and Key Resources Support Annex, <http://www.fema.gov/pdf/emergency/nrf/nrf-support-cikr.pdf> (focus on “protection, response, recovery, and restoration”). Homeland Security, like the FCC, understands that it is essential in an emergency situations justify focusing on protecting, responding, recovering and restoring of existing systems, but new communications facilities construction is and should be deemed

nonessential, and subject to lockdown for so long as we are under emergency conditions.

Cities can and should impose a moratorium on deployment in their local area and freeze the permit process until the COVID-19 emergency is over.

Councilmembers,

Below is some additional information in response to some questions I received from Councilmember Brown about community need, unmet need, and Sister Carmen operations. I had a follow-up call with SCCC and wanted to share the following information.

Eligibility process –

Sister Carmen uses the same criteria for assistance for all programs, including family resource programs as well as benefits for rental, mortgage, utility, water bill, or food assistance. In determining need they have an appointment with the client, have them fill out application with financial information (household income, job status) as well as any other financial resources they may have (unemployment). Based on the financial information they determine if they may be eligible for public assistance programs/benefits. They do not have a cut-off or threshold, but the level of financial need will help determine the amount or level of benefit they may receive.

Unmet need –

At this time, Sister Carmen is not having to turn anyone away for their services. They have received additional funding from community contributions, and believe there is potential for more local/state/federal COVID emergency assistance, as well as emergency housing assistance. They are coordinating with Boulder County and other FRC providers to determine how to allocate any additional funds. They are also working to understand any time limits/horizon on this additional assistance. If the economic impacts are ongoing, and there are continued job losses or lengthy unemployment, the need would likely be extended and potentially worsen. Given the possibility of additional state/local funding, Sister Carmen would utilize emergency funding first and utilize any local funds for Louisville residents once that is exhausted.

I can discuss this further and answer any questions you may have this evening.

FasTracks Positively Impacting the Region's Quality of Life



Since RTD began implementing its FasTracks transit expansion program in 2005, the agency has tracked and monitored the impacts of the program through its Quality of Life studies. The studies synthesize RTD's data-driven evaluation of progress in meeting the FasTracks Program goals. Data is tracked annually in order to compare metrics over time. The 2020 Quality of Life Study is complete. Here are some of the takeaways from this year's study:

- 34,300 multifamily housing units are within a half-mile of a rail or BRT station
- 3,300 affordable housing units are within a half-mile of a rail or BRT station
- Traffic congestion caused 77 million hours of travel delay in 2018
- Time spent in congestion per day equals 229,000 vehicle hours
- 64% of greenhouse gas emissions are from the transportation sector, but...
- .4% of GHG emissions are from transit buses
- 240,000 tons of carbon emissions were displaced due to transit

N Line Promotional Fare Pilot Program



Through March 27, 2021, customers riding the new N Line will benefit from our promotional fare pilot program. Traveling along the entirety of the N Line will be a flat \$3 Local fare one-way. Regal Cinemas Suspending Operations at All U.S. Locations

Second-largest U.S. cinema chain is closing its doors again as high-profile movies vacate calendar

The second-largest cinema chain in the U.S. is closing all of its locations nationwide after reopening in August, escalating the pandemic-driven crisis facing the entertainment industry.

Cineworld Group [CNWGY -50.00%](#) ▼ PLC's Regal Entertainment Group's decision to suspend operations at its more than 500 locations this coming Thursday follows a cascade of postponements for big-budget Hollywood films, most recently the James Bond title "No Time to Die."

The studio behind the film, MGM Holdings Inc., said Friday that it was delaying the film for the second time, to next April from this November. It had originally been scheduled for release in April of this year.

Cineworld is the second-largest movie-theater operator on a global basis as well as in the U.S., after AMC Entertainment Holdings Inc. The

suspension of operations includes its 127 Cineworld and Picturehouse cinemas in the U.K.

“We are like a grocery shop that doesn’t have vegetables, fruit, meat,” Cineworld CEO Mooky Greidinger said in an interview. “We cannot operate for a long time without a product.”

Some Hollywood studios have experimented with shipping big-budget movies directly online. Walt Disney Co. opted against releasing its \$200 million “Mulan” remake in U.S. theaters, and instead put the movie on its streaming service for about \$30. Before that, Comcast Corp.’s Universal Pictures made the family film “Trolls World Tour” available on digital-rental platforms for about \$20.

Like many businesses that rely on gathering consumers in public spaces, theaters in the U.S. have endured historic levels of financial strain for months. After the coronavirus pandemic initially caused most U.S. cinemas to close in March, major chains such as Regal, AMC and Cinemark Holdings Inc. reopened in August ahead of the spy film “Tenet,” distributed by AT&T Inc.’s Warner Bros.

The highly anticipated movie from director Christopher Nolan had been delayed repeatedly amid continuing uncertainty about which theaters would be allowed to open.

But with only about two-thirds of domestic theaters able to open because of varying state and local guidelines, and consumers apparently still wary of going to theaters, the \$200 million movie grossed just \$45.1 million in the U.S. and Canada. That tepid performance has led Hollywood studios to recoil from releasing costly films for now.

North America is the world’s largest theatrical market, grossing more than \$11 billion each year since 2015.

After witnessing domestic moviegoers' subdued interest in "Tenet," Warner Bros. said it was moving "Wonder Woman 1984" to Christmas Day, from October. Disney quickly followed suit, shifting release dates on 10 titles, including bumping its Marvel spinoff "Black Widow" by six months.

The string of delays casts a shadow over the remainder of 2020's movie calendar and potentially over the entire theatrical industry. On Sept. 30, a cinema owners' trade group joined leading filmmakers in sending a letter to lawmakers in the hopes of drumming up financial relief for the ailing sector.

"If the status quo continues, 69% of small and midsize movie theater companies will be forced to file for bankruptcy or to close permanently," the National Association of Theatre Owners said.

When the U.S.'s major theater chains began reopening late this summer, they touted elevated sanitation protocols and capacity limits. Despite assurances they would be safe returning to theaters, U.S. moviegoers haven't rushed back.

Without big-budget titles, theaters have largely screened smaller independent films and older movies.

Movie theaters abroad—many of which have been open for months—have performed better than in the U.S. "Tenet" has grossed \$262 million from international markets, according to Box Office Mojo.

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On top of closing doors again at its more than 500 Regal theaters in the U.S., Cineworld is also suspending operations at its 127 locations in the U.K., the company said. The closures will affect the employment status of thousands of workers, the company said.

For major movie theaters, suspending operations might be less costly than staying open with a limited supply of programming and little consumer demand.

In late September, Cineworld, which is already shouldering a heavy debt load, released dismal midyear financial results. It reported revenue fell nearly 70%, to \$712.4 million, in the six months ending

June 30 when compared with the first half of 2019.

Regal's decision to close its doors again, less than two months after reopening, is partially because theaters in major U.S. markets like Los Angeles and New York City have yet to reopen. Mr. Greidinger recently sent a letter to New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo, imploring the state to evaluate theaters along similar lines as other indoor venues.

In states such as California and New York, theater owners large and small have expressed bewilderment as authorities have allowed some indoor establishments such as restaurants, bowling alleys and churches to open with capacity restrictions while requiring theaters keep their doors closed.

"In the cinema, everyone is seated and looks in the same direction...in the restaurant you take off your mask and you sit one in front of the other," said Mr. Greidinger. "It simply doesn't make sense."

In August, Mr. Cuomo, a Democrat, addressed movie theaters' closures, arguing that they weren't high on the priority list for businesses that should be allowed to reopen. "It is congregate. It's one ventilation system. You're seated there for a long period of time....This is a risky situation," he said.
