A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

What good is the warmth of summer, without the cold of winter to give it sweetness?

ear Louisville Resident:

At the moment there is snow on my daffodils, but hopefully when you read this, it will really be warm spring heading towards summer. Summer in Louisville, of course, means good weather to enjoy open space trails, the Street Faire, concerts in the park and lots of opportunities to be out and about with neighbors, friends and family.

Of course it also means time for road construction. The City will be continuing our aggressive investment in the streets, with our goal of maintaining a high average level of street condition and to have no really poor quality streets. Some of the curb, gutter and sidewalk work is underway and the street work will continue through much of the summer. An exciting project this summer is our long planned pedestrian underpass under State Highway 42/95th Street, connecting Balfour and North End to Kestrel and Steel Ranch. This is a key link in the City's Lake-to-Lake trail connecting Waneka Lake to Harper Lake via open space trails. This project should be underway in early summer and complete by early 2020. We will do our best to minimize construction impacts on traffic.

Speaking of traffic on Highway 42, the City expects to get a federal grant to further plan improvements on the road to deal with the significant traffic issues there. We anticipate adding lanes in both directions and improving intersections. Once a plan is complete, we can make incremental improvements and start to seek funding for the larger parts of the project. We also expect federal grant money to plan and build pedestrian safety crossing improvements on South Boulder Road. Studies of an underpass determined that to be a cost prohibitive option, at least in the next 5 or more years, so we are pursuing options such as pedestrian crossing lights, pedestrian refuges and other at-grade improvements.

In addition to the trail underpass, we are working with the railroad to implement quiet zones at the crossings at Baseline, South Boulder Road, Griffith, Pine and Dillon. This involves making improvements to the crossings such as double crossing gates, building medians and the like which then allows the trains not to blow their horns when they come through town. These improvements have to be signed off on by BNSF and the Public Utilities Commission. We have this approval on 3 of the 5 crossings and are working on the final 2. If you've been following this issue, you know that we have been working on it for a long time, but this is the home stretch. We have the money in the budget to build this year once the approvals are done and BNSF puts us on their construction schedule.

We are in the process of developing Louisville's first Transportation Master Plan. We will be developing programs, policies and projects to help prioritize transportation funding for our own capital improvement budget and when opportunities arise to apply for grant funding from State or Federal Agencies. Later this month the City Council will be reviewing proposed projects and working on prioritizing them. These projects will likely include bike network improvements, multiuse paths, corridor projects (like Highway 42), sidewalk improvements, bike and pedestrian crossings and increased access to transit. We hope to finish this plan by late summer and may even see some smaller improvements late this year.

One of the most challenging issues we've been grappling with is the Sam's Club building, which has been empty since 2010, and that Kohl's has announced they are closing their Louisville store (largely due to Sam's being empty) at the end of this year. The Sam's Club

building has not attracted a new retailer in spite of changes in ownership, multiple brokers and extensive efforts on the part of the City to work out a deal for a new tenant. As a result we recently commissioned a market study to determine what our options were. The most notable finding in the study was the estimate that the entire trade area, which includes pretty much all of Louisville and Superior, could support around 149,000 square feet of new retail space. The Sam's Club building alone is 128,000 square feet. We have concluded this requires us to rethink the vision for that area and allow a greater mix of uses, to make it feasible for someone to redevelop the Sam's and Kohl's properties. This might be a mix of smaller retail, office and residential, including a significant community amenity such as a park or other public gathering place. This is a big change for our community but the evidence appears to demonstrate that the current option only continues to have underutilized or empty buildings (see article below for more information).

It's been a good winter for snowfall in the mountains which means a good year for water supply in Louisville and the Front Range. As we all know, however, water is a precious resource and we always plan for drought years. The City has a good reliable water supply, as we own rights in both South Boulder Creek and in the Colorado-Big Thompson project on the western slope. With the changing climate, water storage is becoming ever more important. The City has joined with other communities in the region to build a new reservoir to store our Colorado River water. This has been in process for 16 years but the permits have been approved and we expect construction of Chimney Hollow Reservoir (west of Carter Lake) to begin late this year. It will take about 4 years to build the dam and a few years after that to fill the lake, but in the long run this will be an important addition to the Louisville water portfolio.

I hope to see you out on the trails or at a great Louisville summer event sometime soon.

MCCASLIN PARCEL O REDEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Louisville's economy has grown significantly over the last several years. Since 2012, there have been over 3,800 new jobs created by Louisville employers; household incomes in Louisville have grown by almost \$10,000 and Louisville businesses have invested approx. \$285,000,000 in their locations, all generating revenue for the City. While Louisville remains in a strong fiscal and economic position, we are still challenged to retain large retailers as we see an expansion of internet sales nationwide. Additionally, the average rental rate in Louisville is higher than other areas within the region.

As the Mayor mentioned, the City initiated a study in July 2018 to identify opportunities within the McCaslin Boulevard area that will encourage retail vibrancy, commercial

health and a desirable place for the community to gather. Ensuring a vibrant retail corridor is vital to the long-term fiscal health of the City. The study looked at potential for several different land use scenarios and measured options based on market feasibility, fiscal impact and community desires.



The consultant's final recommendation was to look at land use and zoning changes to allow for a parcel by parcel redevelopment within the Parcel O area. In February 2019, City Council directed staff to begin preparing a GDP amendment to allow mixed use (retail, commercial, hotel and residential) redevelopment and to begin work with the area property owners to modify the private restrictive covenants to allow for the new uses. Such modifications are expected to come back to City Council for review this summer. LOUISVILLE TRASH SERVICE UPDATE

On March 5th, City Council made the decision to award a 5-year contract to Republic Services as the single waste hauler for the City's refuse, recycling and compost services starting in September 2019. Western Disposal will continue to provide service through August 2019. The decision comes after a year-long process with several public meetings. As part of its purchasing policy requirements, the City is required to issue a Request for Proposals (RFP) every 5 years for these services (as we do annually for street paving, concrete replacement, etc.) that invites qualified providers to submit a proposal, which we evaluate against review criteria. The City awards a contract based on the most complete proposal for services and cost.

This year the City asked providers to submit proposals with an embedded compost rate, where any size composting container is included in the monthly pricing and can promote additional diversion of waste (like your recycling is now). One of the goals of the Louisville Sustainability Action Plan is to increase landfill diversion of waste products through increased recycling and composting activities. As a result, the City continues to be committed to pay as you throw pricing, so your bill will be lower if you generate less trash.

Starting in September, your trash, recycling and composting bill will be provided under one rate dependent on the size of your trash can 32, 64 or 96-gallon). This is different from current pricing where your trash and recycling are one rate and composting is a second rate depending on the size of your trash container and composting container. Republic will provide additional information on the process to change out your containers this summer.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

- Does the City provide trash service? The City contracts with a single waste hauler for the majority of residents to lower service costs, have fewer heavy trucks on streets causing street damage, reduce truck traffic, noise and pollution, improve recycling/composting rates and ensure better customer service.
- Why did the City make this decision? Based on feedback from the community, several factors were highlighted in this year's Request for Proposals, including waste diversion, customer service and cost. The decision to switch to Republic was based on these factors. Almost 75% of customers should experience cost savings through the contract with Republic. In addition to the program that we have now, we will be able to offer some new services starting this fall. A spring and fall curbside leaf/branch pickup event will occur each year on top of the biweekly composting service. In addition to free quarterly bulk item pickups, customers will also have access to an annual bulk item pickup event for up to 5 items. Finally, we will have a local customer service representative who is dedicated to Louisville's service, and for the first time, we will have a mobile application that customers can use.

Previous to this year's RFP process, Western Disposal had successfully been the City's choice for 10 years through two competitive RFP processes. In all RFP processes, criteria such as local vendor preference, value added services, price, vendor experience, schedule, vendor references and quality of equipment were utilized to select the best overall value and level of service for the City's contract. Local vendor consideration was taken into account for Western Disposal. However, the City felt that Republic was able to provide significant cost savings to residents and provide additional value added services that outweighed the local preference.

I've heard negative feedback on Republic in the news, on social media and through the Better Business Bureau. How did the City come to the conclusion that Republic will provide a high level of customer service? During the RFP process, the City requested references from each provider to confirm actual customer level of satisfaction. The City was able to verify Republic's abilities by talking with city staff and elected officials from other communities that utilize Republic's services.

RECREATION/SENIOR CENTER UPDATE

All areas of the facility and programs are buzzing with activity. It is great to see so many people using the facility. We just released our summer catalog with programming for May through August. HOW DOES CITY COUNCIL CREATE NEW RULES?

If you read any of the agendas for a City Council meeting, you will notice the Council takes a variety of actions. The City Charter allows the Council to act in three ways: by ordinance, by resolution or by motion. So what is the different in these?

Ordinance: An ordinance creates a new rule or law that regulates people or property. This new law stays in effect until

CITY ADOPTS 2018 BUILDING CODES

The City of Louisville along with the Louisville Fire District have adopted the 2018 International Building and Fire Codes with local amendments. The latest and greatest technologies for buildings are included in the 2018 Building Codes. To view these codes for free, please visit https://codes.iccsafe.org/category/l-Codes.

Did you know the world's first known building code dates back to 1800 B.C.? Hammurabi was the ruler who established the nation-state of Babylon (in modern day Iraq). Hammurabi's Code gave the world the first written building codes. They were unusually simplistic by today's standards but very matter-of-fact. For instance, "if a builder builds a house for some one and completes it, he shall give him a fee of two shekels in money for each sar of surface."

Just a reminder, we are starting to see our second wave of roofing permits come through the doors from the June 2018 Hail Storm. Make sure your contractor has permitted the reroof work. You should have a permit card in the window or door of your house that is placed by the contractor and issued by the City. If a contractor is reroofing your house and you do not have a permit card, please call the City's Planning and Building Safety Department at 303.335.4584 to verify that a permit has been issued. Roofs that are not installed properly can lead to water damage of the structure and mold in the attic space and walls.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

Construction of two traffic signals at State Highway 42 and S. 104th and Dillon Road and S. 104th is underway but work has been delayed due to traffic signal pole manufacturing and delivery issues. Concrete replacement work has begun on various streets within Louisville and will continue through July. Street resurfacing work will begin in early June and street reconstruction work will begin in early July. It is anticipated that construction of the State Highway 42 Underpass north of Hecla Dr. will begin in early June.

Sanitary sewer main replacement and water line replacement will be bid in May and construction is expected throughout the City from June to September. We ask for your understanding during construction and remind everyone to exercise caution when driving, biking or walking through a construction zone. The City of Louisville is the first Colorado municipality to graduate from Xcel's Partners in Energy program and enter into the newest partnership, Energy Future Collaboration.





The City of Louisville is one of only eight Colorado municipalities to partner with Xcel through Energy Future Collaboration, which focuses on carbon-free planning.

In fall 2018, the City was awarded a zero-waste grant from Boulder County that will enable the City to increase its recycling capabilities in our parks, open space and downtown locations. CITY TO RECEIVE FEDERAL TRANSPORTATION FUNDING

Pending final approval, the City will receive just over \$1.8 million in federal funds through the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The projects (scheduled to be finalized by DRCOG in August) include a State Highway 42 Conceptual Design Plan, at-grade crossing improvements on South Boulder Road between Main Street and Eisenhower and the 104th Street trail connecting the regional Coal Creek trail to the regional Rock Creek trail.

Every 4 years, the Denver Regional Council of Governments (DRCOG) establishes a plan for the distribution of federal transportation funding in the Denver Metro Area, including Boulder County. The TIP will help to implement the multimodal transportation vision of the region through projects funded in 2020-2023. Through a competitive, sub-regional (county) funding process, the City would be awarded \$1,828,293 in federal funds for the three projects. The projects

ects will require a local match, which will be provided by Louisville, and in some cases regional partners, including the City of Lafayette and Boulder County. Projects awarded in Louisville include:

- State Highway 42 Conceptual Design Plan for Reconfiguration Louisville and Lafayette have identified the need to improve the overall design and use of the corridor in order to improve safety and reliability, provide consistent, continous multimodal facilities, improve transit access and reduce traffic congestion. This project will incorporate these elements into the existing corridor.
- South Boulder Road At-Grade Safety Improvements

 The project will complete design and construction of at-grade crossing improvements proposed at five intersections along South Boulder Road between Main Street and Eisenhower to provide safety and mobility enhancements that can be implemented in the short term.
- Coal Creek/Rock Creek Regional Trails Connection at 104th Street - This project will provide a multimodal trail option along 104th Street on the edge of jointly owned Louisville, Boulder County and Lafayette Open Space. The project will connect two heavily used regional trails -Coal Creek trail and Rock Creek trail.

CODE CORNER



Springtime Sprouts -

Spring not only sees flourishing flowers but baby wildlife, as well. Babies may often times be seen alone, but in most cases, parents are nearby watching or gathering food. If you observe a baby bird hopping around chirping, do not assume it's injured;

it could just be learning to fly. The parents are most likely nearby, encouraging the fledgling. It is best to leave the bird alone.

Baby raccoons and skunks will be growing bigger and more noticeable towards the summer season. A family of raccoons or skunks should be left alone. It the animals present a problem (i.e. living in an inappropriate place around your house or yard), there are resources you can contact like Colorado Parks and Wildlife (https://cpw.state.co.us) or private pest control companies for removal alternatives.

This time of year, you may also be more likely to observe bats, nature's own mosquito control. Bats can carry the rabies virus, a danger to both humans and other animals. If you discover a bat in your house, do not touch it. Call Police Dispatch at 303.441.4444 and report it, so the bat may be safely captured. For more information, please visit the Boulder County website at https://www.bouldercounty.org/families/diseases/rabies.

Pets in Summertime - Many pets prefer to stay home, but if you must take your pet with you in the car, please do so safely. Pets should ride in pet carriers/travel crates or wear a safety harness. Heat stress is not the only danger your pet faces when alone in the car. Many pets are stolen each year from unattended cars. If you must leave your pet in the car, please ensure that it has proper ventilation (i.e. windows at least half-way down on both sides of the vehicle for cross breeze), has access to water and is not left in the car longer than 10-15 minutes. On a 72 degree day, a car's internal temperature can heat up to 116 degrees within one hour. You can be issued a ticket or warning for animal cruelty for not providing proper ventilation and water.

Signs of heat stress include: heavy panting, glazed eyes, rapid pulse, unsteadiness, vomit or a deep red or purple tongue. If your pet is overheated, move them to a cooler area and gradually lower their body temperature by sprinkling cool or cold water on them and wetting their ear flaps and paws; place cool, wet towels over the back of their neck, armpits and groin area; direct a fan on them, offer fresh, cool water; and take your pet immediately to a veterinarian.

If you see an animal in a car exhibiting signs of heat stress, call Police Dispatch at 303.441.4444 immediately. Provide the specific location of the car, description of the vehicle and license plate number and wait for an officer. Please do not get into a confrontation with the owner. With the license plate number, the officer can contact the driver at his or her home.

Vegetation Overgrowth - Louisville is fortunate enough to have many outdoor recreational opportunities, including the enjoyment of walking or running. Sidewalks provide for safe foot traffic throughout the City. Please keep bushes, trees and other vegetation trimmed away from the sidewalk. Trees should be trimmed 8 feet above the sidewalk and 16 feet above the street.

PARKS & OPEN SPACE NEWS

MEDIAN LANDSCAPE PROJECT

The Parks, Recreation & Open Space Department is working on a 2-year endeavor to make improvements to the medians along the major corridors within the City (S. Boulder, Via Appia, Cherry, Dillon & McCaslin). This project was included in the 2019-2020 biennial budget that was adopted in 2018.

Originally staff worked with the design firm MIG to develop several design concepts and settled on a preferred concept that focused on making improvements to the current medians without major design changes. This project will look at each corridor and also each median to determine the extent of the changes/upgrades needed. These improvements could include irrigation system upgrades and removal and replacement of vegetation including turf, shrubs and trees. The intent is to also include additional pops of color along some of the medians with planters with annuals where appropriate.

The planning of this project has begun and the goal is to begin construction of the medians this fall and continue into 2020 to finish the remaining medians. We will work with the consultant, Public Works and our Parks and Public Landscaping Advisory Board (PPLAB) to prioritize the order in which the medians are renovated. PLAYGROUND REPLACEMENT PROJECT

Many of the playgrounds in the City were installed around the same time and are in need of some refreshing. That is the intent behind our playground replacement project. City Council has allocated funding in each of the next two years to replace playground equipment to offer new and enhanced play experiences for the community.



Staff just recently solicited bids from companies interested in partnering with the City to design and install upgraded playground features. Staff reviewed three potential bids and ultimately selected HPM/Architerra as the design and construction team for this project. Staff plans on kicking off the project in May and completing outreach and design through the summer and installing new play equipment this fall. The first playground to be replaced will be Dutch Creek (otherwise known as Elephant Park). We plan to follow-up with a renovation of Keith Helart Park in 2020.

Our goal is to complete a minimum of two playgrounds and based on budgeted funds, we are working to complete a third playground, as well. The third playground to be replaced is located at the City's Sports Complex located off of State Highway 42.

In future budget cycles, the Parks, Recreation and Open Space Department plans to request additional funds to complete other playground renovations as needed. LEARN ABOUT LOCAL WILDLIFE WHILE WALKING

The Open Space Division has installed three interpretive panels at the Hecla Lake Open Space bird blind. Stop by and take a look and learn about resident birds, migratory birds and other wildlife in our area. In an effort to increase wildlife habitat, staff has also installed three American kestrel and two Eastern screech owl nest boxes on select open space properties and on the Coal Creek Golf Course.



MOSQUITO SAFETY

The City contracts with Vector Disease Control International (VDCI) for Mosquito Control Services for the community. Citizens concerned about mosquito problems or issues may report their concerns by calling VDCI at 888-774-2161, emailing them at mkyer@vdci.net or visiting the VDCI website at

http://www.vdci.net/colorado. Boulder County Public Health and the City urge residents to remember the 4Ds when protecting themselves against West Nile Virus:

- Use **DEET**-enhanced insect repellent
- **DRESS** in long sleeves and pants
- Avoid the outdoors from DUSK to DAWN
- **DRAIN** standing water outside your home

LOUISVILLE TRASH SERVICE UPDATE CONTINUED

The City has followed up on any media coverage related to Republic to ensure the service we provide to residents will continue to be of high quality.

- I'm concerned that Republic is a national company and will not provide adequate local service. Will this be a problem? The City's contract with Republic requires a dedicated Louisville customer service representative that will live and work in the Front Range. The City's customer service will not be provided by a national call center.
- What is the price difference for my trash service from Western to Republic? Based on current customer service levels, approximately 75% of our customers will begin saving money in September under the new contract and rate structure.
- What additional services can I expect? The City will add the following services for residents through Republic starting this fall:
 - o Mobile application for customers to use
 - o Spring and fall curbside tree branch and leaf pickup (exact dates to be determined)
 - o Annual curbside 5 bulk item pickup event in addition to the free bulk item quarterly pickup
- Is my pickup date changing? Currently the City's trash service takes place on Thursday. Starting in September, services will be provided Tuesday through Friday. The day of the week for service will coincide with specific areas or neighborhoods. Neighborhoods will only have collection service on one day of the week for that neighborhood. Many residents will see a slight change from their current collection day. You can expect more information from Republic about routing schedules in late summer.
- Is it unsafe to have service on more than one day of the week? Service on multiple days is equally safe as having service on one day of the week. The amount of homes that need service and amount of miles that are driven do not change whether service is on one day or several days. While your day of the week may change for service, your neighborhood will still only have collection trucks on its streets one day of the week. Under our current contract, Western Disposal utilizes 13 trucks over the course of one day to service the City. The new contract with Republic will utilize 4 trucks from Tuesday to Friday to service specific areas of the City each day. Western Disposal has had an excellent safety record and Republic also has an excellent safety record.
- Will the items I'm allowed to throw away, recycle or compost change? There will not by any changes to what customers are able to throw away, recycle or compost.
 Trash collection will continue to go to the landfill; recy-

- cling collection will go to the Boulder County Recycling Facility; and compost collection will abide by the Emerald Ash Borer quarantine rules and go to A1 Organics. Current guidelines that will continue to apply are available at https://westerndisposal.com/city-louisville. Updated materials will be available by mid-summer to reflect the transition to Republic.
- How will branch composting be handled? The City
 will continue to compost tree branches but it is currently
 undetermined as to how exactly tree branch collection
 will work. Tree branches may be required to be bundled
 or may continue to be able to be disposed of within the
 compost containers as customers currently do. The City
 will provide more information soon.
- Will the City provide additional information? The City will continue to provide information throughout spring and summer, so that residents are prepared for the transition. More details will be provided with your next utility bill in May and are also available here on the City's website. Updates will also be provided in the Summer/ Fall Community Update Newsletters and a direct mailing to customers in mid-summer with information on the process to change out your containers and details on the day of the week your home will receive service. We'll also schedule neighborhood meetings to discuss upcoming changes and answer any questions.
- Can I transfer Western's stickers for extra trash to Republic? No, Western stickers will not be transferrable.
- Is the color of my cart changing? Residents will receive a blue Republic cart with a color-coded lid to designate all three waste streams. The color code is as follows: black lid (solid waste), light blue lid (recycle) and green lid (compost). The existing City programs that includes three available cart sizes for each waste stream will remain the same under Republic's collection.
- What is the new rate structure? Rates will be based on your solid waste cart size and includes recycling and compost collection. You no longer have to subscribe with additional fees for compost. Choose any size recycling and compost cart to fit your waste generation needs, regardless of solid waste container size. Additional carts are available for residents who already subscribe to the largest cart (fees do apply). The new rate structure is as follows: \$12.75 for 32-gallon solid waste cart, \$25.50 for 64-gallon solid waste cart or \$38.25 for 96-gallon solid waste cart (recycle and compost included in all rates).
- Can I change my cart mix? The City has provided Republic with a list of addresses and current cart mix associated with that address. If you are happy with your mix of carts, no further action is needed and carts will be delivered to your address in August. If you prefer to make changes to your mix of collection carts, further outreach will be coming in May and June with a process to choose your personalized cart mix.

that ordinance is repealed or updated. Ordinances are used to approve the borrowing of money, impose a new tax, buy or sell land or water rights, update the Municipal Code and any regulation for where a fine or imprisonment may be imposed. The only way to repeal or update an ordinance is by another ordinance approved by Council or a vote on it at a City-wide election.

The City Charter requires all ordinances have two readings in front of the Council. After the first reading, the ordinance is published in full in the newspaper. At the second reading, the Council holds a public hearing. For ordinances the public is given two chances to speak and give their input on the proposed legislation.

Resolution: A resolution deal with matters that can be more temporary. It is a binding decision of the Council but it can be changed at any time by a single vote of the Council. Just as with ordinances, the Council takes public input on all resolutions.

Motion: A motion is used to approve those items that do not require a resolution or ordinance. This can include minutes, contracts, City policies or work plans and meeting schedule changes.

The Council takes public input on all items on the agenda including ordinances, resolutions and motions. In fact your input is encouraged! How do I know what is coming in front of Council for consideration? All agendas are published on the City's website (www.louisvilleco.gov) at least 72 hours prior to the meeting. If you want to be notified when agendas are published, sign up for eNotifications at www.louisvilleco.gov/enotification. AIRPORT NOISE MITIGATION UPDATE

Rocky Mountain Metropolitan Airport (RMMA) is located in the City and County of Broomfield and operated by Jefferson County. Located only 3 miles south of Louisville, aircraft overflights and noise are a growing concern for the community. Louisville has partnered with Superior to hire a consulting team with specialized experience working with communities and airports to address noise issues. The consultants will develop strategies aimed at reducing impacts to both communities.

A baseline asssessment is currently underway that will help understand current conditions and identify opportunities for improvement. We are also planning to host a community workshop this summer to give residents an opportunity to ask questions and provide additional input. 
