I'm thrilled to welcome the new Louisville Fire Protection District (LFPD) Chief Kevin Milan to Louisville. Kevin comes to us from South Metro Fire Rescue, and brings with him decades of experience.

I'm confident that Chief Milan will carry on John Willson's legacy as a strong, community-focused leader for LFPD.

As we welcome Chief Milan to our community, I know many of you will be interested to learn more about him. That's why I asked the Chief to sit for an interview with Louisville's very own Mario the Miner. Mario, over to you!



**Mario: Chief Milan, thanks for joining us. We're happy you're here! What are you enjoying about Louisville so far?**

Chief Milan: I'm truly enjoying the people; from the incredible members of our team to the most engaged and informed community members anywhere. The passion in this community is palpable. This community truly understands the importance of synergy; that is, the impact of our combined efforts is so much greater than the sum of our individual or agency contributions. The respect for emergency responders and engagement of the community in our common mission is remarkable.

**Is there anything you are specifically excited about for LFPD in the next few years?**

I'm not excited about any one thing, I'm excited about everything. The District is at the threshold of so many exciting endeavors. Our Emergency Medical Services continue to forge relationships that allow us to provide the absolute best care. Similarly, the art of emergency response is fast becoming a science. Our firefighters are at the forefront of evidence-based practice. We're fortifying partnerships across the county, state and the nation. We are the perfect size department to be agile and innovative. We are embracing initiatives to improve firefighter health and wellness and are involved in groundbreaking research in these areas with many academic and fire service leaders.

**We're looking forward to partnering with you on increasing our wildfire resilience in Louisville. What do you think is the most effective tool for building a wildfire-ready community?**

The recent wildfire and conflagration risk assessment says it best: 'Participation is more important than perfection.' There are things we can all do to reduce our risk of wildfire and conflagration at our homes and businesses. This study cites four commonalities in conflagration; drought, extreme weather, dense development, and fuel pathways. The one item we can impact is fuel pathways. Widespread implementation of mitigation is more effective than a few projects being completed perfectly. Louisville understands and embraces the importance of home hardening and defensible space.

**What other priorities do you have for LFPD? Besides, ya know, saving lives and serving our community with excellence.**

For me it's all about improving our team. We have incredible personnel and my job is to set a direction, get them the tools and resources they need, and support them in doing their work. I'm confident we have the best firefighters anywhere. My priority is to ensure we are better every day, and, 'ya know,' that translates into saving lives and serving with excellence.

**Enough about the job, life can't be all work! What are you happiest doing when you're not working?**

Spending time with my family is truly my happy place. Skiing Vail's back bowls on a deep powder day or sunning on a white sandy beach with them is what I truly love most. This year the snow is a little thin, so we've been working on some of life's simpler pleasures. That said, I'm praying for snow and an extended ski season!

## Louisville Police Department launches monthly statistics dashboard

In January, the Louisville Police Department unveiled a new interactive dashboard which allows residents to visualize the department's activity each month, including total calls for service, number of traffic stops, property crimes, and the number of case reports.

## Front and Center Project update

Have you heard? Downtown Louisville is getting a glow up! The Front & Center project is an initiative of the Louisville Revitalization Committee, and the first phase of the implementation of the Downtown Vision Plan. Planning is moving forward on exciting improvements to downtown, with construction currently anticipated to begin in Fall 2026. To reduce impacts during our busiest event season, work is expected to take place primarily October through May, with construction likely happening in two phases through spring 2028. While timelines are still being refined, this approach is designed to keep downtown active and event-friendly.

New upgrades include transforming the Steinbaugh area into a vibrant new plaza featuring a new pavilion, green space, playground, splash pad, enhanced lighting, and flexible gathering areas. Plans also include making Front Street more accessible and pedestrian-friendly with a curbless design, along with new string lighting and landscaping improvements on Main Street to enhance the overall look and feel of downtown.

### Wildfire preparedness updates

Council continues discussions related to aligning with the state minimum Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) code. Council recently passed two emergency ordinances: Ordinance No. 1913 banned new juniper plantings citywide. Ordinance No. 1916 implemented new defensible space landscaping standards in the Marshall Fire rebuild area. Both ordinances were implemented to increase our resilience as community in the event of a wildfire. Council received a presentation on the Louisville Fire Protection District's Wildfire and Conflagration Risk Assessment (WCRA) at its February 17 meeting and will next focus on WUI maps with upcoming discussions this March and April. 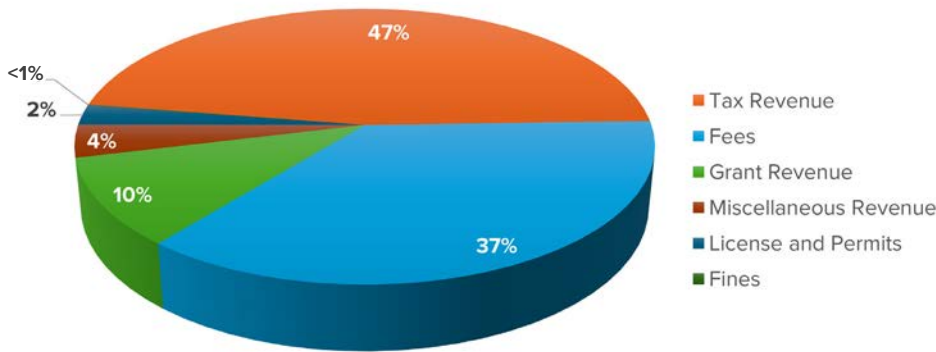

## 2026 REVENUE SOURCES AND TRENDS

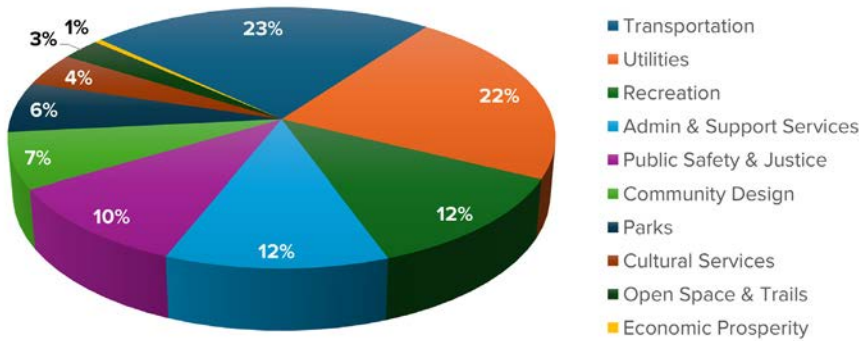

## REVENUE TRENDS

The City is in good fiscal health. The General Fund reserve is projected to be above a target of 25% of operational expenditures through 2030. The minimum unrestricted fund balance is set at 15% of current operating expenditures.

## CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (CIP)

The City's CIP includes expenditures for buildings, land, parks, water and sewer plants, and other commodities of a significant value that have a useful life of several years. The planning period for the City's CIP is 6 years. The expenditures for the first year of the program are incorporated into the current year's budget.

The City will invest **\$31.5 million** in capital projects during the current CIP cycle, with significant investment into the South Street Underpass and Downtown Vision project.

Expenditures by program exclude interfund transfers, debt service, and certain central fund-wide charges.

## Sharing our Open Space with coyotes

One of the wonderful parts of living in Louisville is the opportunity to experience wildlife close to home. Coyotes are a natural and common part of Louisville Open Space and the Front Range. Coyotes are active year-round and are often more visible in late winter and spring. Breeding season runs from January through March, with pups typically born from April to mid-May. While sightings can happen anytime, coyotes are most active at dawn and dusk. If you notice unusual or concerning coyote behavior, you can submit a report using the City's online Coyote Report Form or contact Colorado Parks and Wildlife. For emergencies, call 911. Reports help staff and wildlife officials respond appropriately and protect both people and wildlife. ## Louisville named Bird City Colorado

In December, the City of Louisville was officially designated a Bird City, Colorado by Environment for the Americas — becoming just the seventh city in the state to earn this recognition. The designation reflects Louisville's ongoing commitment to habitat protection and wildlife conservation and builds on other environmental recognitions, including Bee City USA, Tree City USA, and Coal Creek Golf Course's Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary certification. Thank you to Nathaniel Goeckner, Senior Natural Resource Specialist, and the Open Space Advisory Board for their leadership and work to make this happen.

## Improvements at Daughenbaugh Open Space Parking Lot

Earlier this year, resurfacing work was completed at the Daughenbaugh Open Space parking lot. The project included resurfacing and grading the aggregate lot, installing timber curbing as retaining structures, adding a new fence and bollard to prevent illegal vehicle access, and making site upgrades to improve safety, accessibility, and long-term durability. These improvements support continued use of the area and create a smoother, safer experience for visitors.

The popular Read to Rover program, which has been a regular feature at the Library since 2011, attracts young people who want to improve their reading confidence and hang out with adorable pups. Everyone takes a turn reading to (and petting) the dogs, whose owners volunteer their time to this worthwhile program that has had a positive effect on so many children — including Isaac and Emma.

Katie, mom of Isaac (age 4½) and Miriam (nearly age 2), commented on the value of Read to Rover:

“We love Read to Rover! It really helps Isaac wind down and relax after a busy day at preschool and learn gentleness and respect with the dogs. He has been an avid and early reader so he loves having the chance to practice reading out loud, and I love seeing him grow in confidence. It's such a creative way to help kids get more comfortable as they learn to read, and I wholeheartedly recommend it.”

Commenting on her family's experience, Elizabeth, mom to Emma (age 6), said:

“Even though Emma was only 3½ years old when we started participating and she could not read by herself at the time, I wanted her to experience working with a therapy dog. Every dog at the library has displayed calmness, sweetness, and immense patience, and my daughter has gained an appreciation and love for her furry friends.

“Last year when she was in kindergarten and learned how to read fluently, she was finally able to read to the therapy dog all by herself. At first, she read in a whisper. When I prompted her to read louder so the dog could hear her, she raised her voice slightly. As the school year progressed, she became more confident and less self-conscious about reading aloud.

“Now that she is in first grade, she is able to articulate her words with confidence. It's a heartwarming sight to see my daughter sharing her love of reading to a furry friend and others around her. This program is truly amazing, and we are very fortunate to have access to it.”

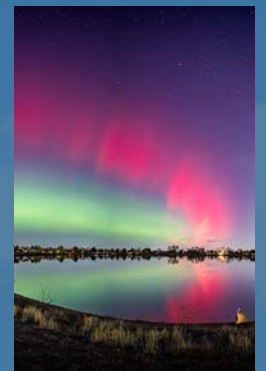
