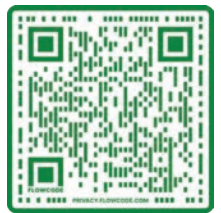

FROM THE DESK OF

MAYOR CHRIS LEH



Summer is here! Spring brought us some much-needed moisture, if a bit late. I'm hoping for more rain this summer. But I'm also hoping it chooses moments which don't dampen another jam-packed event season in Louisville. In the meantime, I appreciate the steps our residents and businesses are taking to conserve water during this drought.

On top of the return of highly-anticipated annual events like Street Faire, Dinner on Main and the Taste of Louisville, the Louisville Farmer's Market, and Summer Concerts in the Park, we'll also be celebrating **America 250/Colorado 150**, significant milestones for our nation and Colorado. July 4th is the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence — its semiquincentennial. August 1st commemorates the 150th anniversary of Colorado's entry into the Union — its sesquicentennial. We'll also be bringing the fun with an extra-special Fourth of July celebration, and other events and programs celebrating Louisville's history, including a nod to our Italian heritage with the "Find the Pomodoro" art scavenger hunt, walking tours, History Happy Hours with staff members from the Historical Museum, and more! Please visit LouisvilleCO.gov/Colorado150 for more info on the events and special programs Louisville is hosting as we celebrate these milestones.

I hope you'll find the time between all our amazing events to attend one of our summer ward meetings with our City Councilmembers in July or my next Mayor's Community Meeting in August. These are opportunities to chat with your elected representatives and ask about what's new in Louisville. In July, the Council will have its budget retreat to begin setting spending priorities for the next two years. Visit LouisvilleCO.gov/WardMeetings for dates, times, and locations.

I'd also like to take a moment to celebrate the final adoption of the Comprehensive Plan in March. After two years of research, the most expansive and inclusive community engagement in the City's history, drafting, and revisions, we have a guiding document that we can all be proud of! Thank you to our City's Community Development team for leading this effort, and to all of you who shaped the vision, values, and goals in this document. We are already taking steps to update Louisville's planning codes and zoning. There will be plenty of opportunities for public engagement as we move forward. You can learn more at LouisvilleCO.gov/Plans.

In the near term, City Council is looking forward to the 2027/2028 budget development process and advancing priorities identified in the 2026 City Council Work Plan. We're also considering potential ballot issues to present to voters in the November election. City Council created a Historic Preservation Tax Task Force to advise Council on whether the Historic Preservation Tax should be placed on the 2026 ballot, and if so, what the amount should be, and how the tax revenue should be used. Council is also considering several ballot measures to update Louisville's City Charter, and will discuss all potential ballot issues on June 16.

As you know, Louisville is full of fun and beauty and community in every season! Summers are pure magic. Summertime is a time to soak up the sunshine, enjoy the outdoors, and come together to enjoy one another's company — in our neighborhoods; in our parks, open spaces, and trails; in our incredible events. This summer will be a good one, and I hope you will find ways to celebrate the season and the great City you help to make even better!

Water Meter Replacement Project

This summer, the City will begin the Water Meter Replacement Project, which will involve replacing or retrofitting every single meter in Louisville. Unless your home has an outdoor water meter, you'll need to schedule an appointment for a technician to replace your meter. Visit LouisvilleCO.gov/MeterReplacement for more information.

New Comprehensive Plan adopted

The Louisville City Council unanimously adopted the City's updated Comprehensive Plan at their March 24 meeting. The Comprehensive Plan is a guiding document written with the community, for the community. It helps elected officials make decisions now and into the future that support the community's vision for what they want Louisville to be. The final Plan reflects two years of extensive and multifaceted community engagement and multiple drafts and revisions. To review the full plan, visit LouisvilleCO.gov/Plans.

Front and Center project update

We're continuing to move forward with the Front & Center project, an initiative of the Louisville Revitalization Commission and the first phase of the Downtown Vision Plan. Updated designs were recently presented to the Revitalization Commission, incorporating feedback from the community, event organizers, downtown businesses, and City Council. Plans include transforming the Steinbaugh Pavilion area into a vibrant gathering space featuring a new pavilion and performance area, green space, a splash pad, enhanced lighting, flexible seating and gathering areas, and improved landscaping. Design updates also include a more pedestrian-friendly, curbless Front Street and expanded lighting and streetscape improvements along Main Street. Construction is anticipated to begin as early as fall 2026, with work expected to take place primarily between October and May to help reduce impacts during Louisville's busy event season. Improvements will likely be implemented in phases, helping keep downtown active, accessible, and event-friendly throughout construction. Project planning and cost refinement are still ongoing, with additional design details and phasing plans expected to continue developing throughout 2026.

New City website coming this summer

We've heard your feedback about our City website, and relief is on the way! City staff has been working to build a new, modern, more accessible City website from the ground up, focused on making it much easier to find the information you need. We expect to launch the new site later this summer.

Call for applicants: Youth Advisory Board

Be heard. Make a difference! Louisville's Youth Advisory Board is open to students in grades 6–12 who want more than a seat at the table. You'll set the agenda, run the meetings, and connect directly with City Council while building real leadership skills and learning how local government works from the inside. LOUISVILLE POLICE

Everyone has a role in community safety

Community safety is a shared responsibility, and in Louisville, it's something we build together every day. The Louisville Police Department remains committed to listening, responding, and working alongside our community to ensure that our city continues to be a safe and welcoming place for all.

A SAFER COMMUNITY TOGETHER

Over the past several years, Louisville has seen a significant and encouraging trend: crime has steadily decreased following a spike in 2021. From 2021 through 2025, crime has been reduced by 46.6%. This progress reflects not only the dedicated work of our officers, but also the vigilance, partnership, and proactive efforts of our community.

While we are proud of this progress, we know that maintaining and improving community safety requires continued effort from all of us.

RESPONDING TO COMMUNITY CONCERNS: TRAFFIC SAFETY INITIATIVE

One of the most common concerns we hear from residents is traffic safety. In response, the Louisville Police Department has launched an enhanced Traffic Safety Initiative focused on making our roadways safer for everyone.

This initiative emphasizes both education and enforcement and is supported through grant funding from the Click It or Ticket and High Visibility Enforcement program grants, in partnership with the Colorado Department of Transportation and the U.S. Department of Transportation.

Enforcement efforts through September 30, 2026, will focus on:

- ▶ Speeding
- ▶ Crash-causing behaviors such as following too closely, careless and distracted driving
- ▶ Unregistered and uninsured vehicles
- ▶ E-bike and bicycle violations
- ▶ Seat belt compliance

Officers will increase their presence in areas where violations and crashes are most frequently reported. These high-visibility efforts are designed not just to address violations, but to encourage safer, long-term driving habits.

Traffic safety remains a top priority, and safer streets depend on all of us doing our part.

The department is working toward establishing a dedicated Traffic Safety Team and introducing motorcycle officers to enhance visibility and enforcement across the city.

SIMPLE STEPS TO PREVENT CRIME

Just as with traffic safety, crime prevention starts with everyday actions. Many crimes of opportunity can be prevented with a few simple habits:

- ▶ Close and secure garage doors, especially when they are not in your line of sight
- ▶ Lock all doors and windows at home and in your vehicle
- ▶ Remove valuables from vehicles or keep them out of sight
- ▶ Report suspicious activity promptly
- ▶ Install and use exterior lighting to deter unwanted activity (safety lighting can also be dark sky compliant)
- ▶ Get to know your neighbors and look out for one another

BUILDING A CULTURE OF SAFETY

The goal of our efforts, through traffic safety and crime prevention, is to create lasting behavior change and build a culture of safety that extends beyond any one campaign.

Together, through awareness, accountability, and partnership, we can continue to make Louisville a safer place to live, work, and visit. Everyone has a role in community safety, and together, we are making a difference.

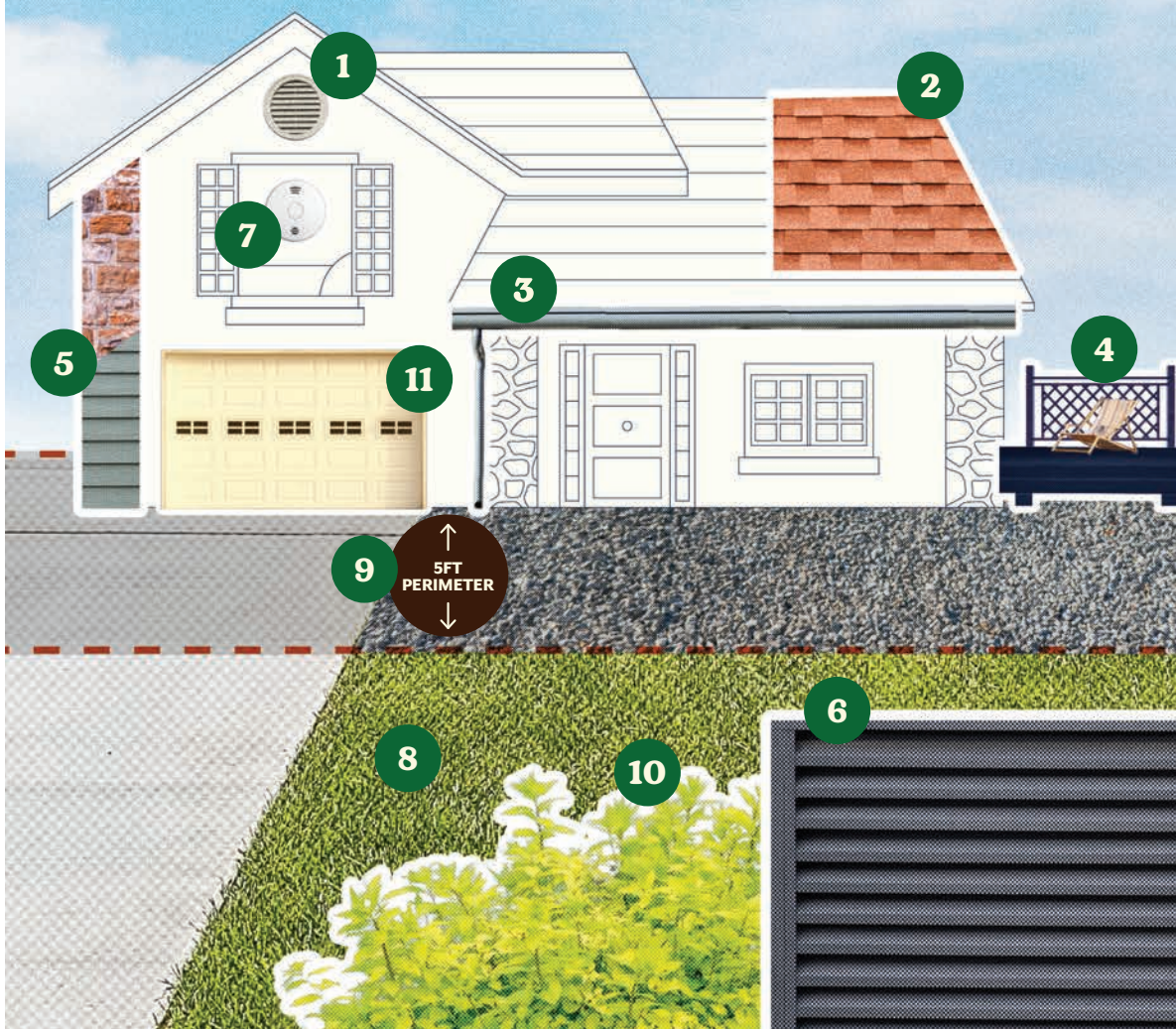

The Fire Hardening Checklist



The new City of Louisville Fire Hardening Code helps you protect your home and property from wildfire risks. Follow these clear, step-by-step, instructions to help prevent the spread of fires and keep your community safe.



Required by City of Louisville ordinance

- 1 **Roof, Attics, and Foundation Vents**
 Cover all vents, including under eaves vents, with maximum 1/8" metal mesh to prevent debris buildup.
- 2 **Roof Coverings**
 Use Class A covers or shingles that protect the roof deck.
- 3 **Gutters**
 Install metal gutters only. Never use vinyl.
 Cover with gutter guards to prevent debris buildup.
- 4 **Decks**
 Use Class A decking materials and Class A or metal railings.
 For decks 6 feet or lower, cover the ground underneath with gravel over plastic, or a concrete slab to prevent vegetation growth.
- 5 **Sidings and Eaves**
 Use Class A materials, or fire resistant materials such as stone or stucco.
- 6 **Fences**
 Use Class A materials or fire resistant materials such as metal, masonry, or stone for fencing within 5 feet of your home or property.
- 7 **Smoke Alarms**
 Install and regularly test smoke alarms. (Required by ICC general standard code).
- 8 **Junipers**
 Do not plant new juniper bushes. Their dense vegetation and trapped debris make them highly combustible.

Recommended

- 9 **Protect the First Five Feet**
 Remove all vegetation (including roots). Cover the bare soil with 3/4" crushed stone or rock to a depth of two inches, or use brick or other noncombustible materials.
- 10 **Landscaping**
 Choose fire-resistant vegetation like oak and yarrow to reduce the risk of fire hazards.
- 11 **Garage Doors**
 Know how to manually open garage doors in case of a power outage.

Mowing frequency depends on land type, plant growth, and use. High-traffic parks, sports fields, and trail corridors are mowed regularly for safety and accessibility. Other areas are mowed less, or not at all, to support native plants, pollinators, wildlife, and erosion control. Staff use electric equipment whenever possible to cut noise and air pollution, with gas tools reserved for thick or woody growth. To view maps and schedules, visit LouisvilleCO.gov/Mowing.

This three mile one-way route will take you through some of Louisville's most popular destinations, including Harper Lake, Coyote Run Open Space and Cottonwood Park. The City's Branch Recycling Site, located just north of the Louisville Cemetery on Empire Road, is open to residents for woody plant material disposal. From April through October, the site operates on the first Saturday of each month from 8 a.m.–1 p.m. Additionally, appointments can be scheduled by contacting Miranda at (303) 335-4768. Proof of residency is required. Only natural wood waste is accepted; leaves, grass clippings, and non-woody materials are not permitted. Self-serve mulch is available year-round.
